

Dear Cllr. Gibbons

I was born in Beckley and lived there for 25 years until my father died in 1975. Many people will still remember our family and particularly my brother John who I know still keeps in contact with several friends at Beckley. Yes I'm afraid it really was us who kept damming the stream in Otmoor Lane!

I now live in a small village in France having retired 4 years ago and it is in connection with this that I am writing to you. The president of our village association would love to make contact with a similar village to ours preferably close to Oxford, with a view to setting up a twinning association. Our village St. Louans is about the same size as Beckley and is set on a small hill overlooking the River Vienne and surrounded by vineyards. We are close to the town of Chinon (10 minutes walk) where Henry 11 and Richard the Lion Heart, kings of England and France lived and died in the magnificent fortress. Of course you will have heard of our excellent wines and you can imagine that the people here are friendly and hospitable.

We have talked about the possibility of twinning with an English village for a long time and accept there would be perhaps problems in generating enough interest in two such small villages. I might add that very few of my neighbours can speak English. However the Association of St. Louans is very strong and Monsieur Le President is very keen.

I should be grateful if you could discuss this letter with your colleagues in principle. If you think that from your side of the channel the idea is viable I will have no problems convincing you of the attractions of our area and the welcome that would await you.

RSPB Otmoor nature reserve

Volunteer news

The beginning of December saw the completion of the willow coppice work and the start of the annual blackthorn coppice programme.

Hedgerows on the reserve are cut on a 7- or 15-year rotation, which benefits a wide variety of wildlife, including butterfly species such as brown and black hairstreaks. These species thrive in a mosaic of different-aged scrub, and favour younger plants for egg laying.

Coppice rotation also reduces the overall height of the hedge. Tall hedgerows provide cover for predators, making the fields intimidating for ground-nesting birds. The area that can be used by these birds is increased by coppicing.

Blackthorn coppicing constitutes a large part of the winter work programme and, as anyone who has been involved in this kind of work will tell you, it is not the most pleasant or glamorous task. However, our teams put in a great deal of effort and have so far coppiced 235 metres of blackthorn, equal to the length of two football pitches! It is because of the volunteer's hard work that the thorn management programme is well on track for completion in early March, thus avoiding disturbance to nesting birds.

Bird and wildlife news

December saw a sudden end to the site's starling roost, disappointing many visitors. At the

beginning of the month, counts of starling coming into the reedbed had numbered between 20,000 and 50,000. After the Christmas period, however, not a single bird could be seen. This contrasted with last year, when birds were still numbering tens of thousands toward the end of January.

Although the starlings took an earlier bow than expected, there has still been plenty of other bird activity throughout the winter. The list of raptors regularly seen on the reserve between December and February has been impressive. Resident species, such as sparrowhawk, red kite, buzzard and barn owl, were joined by winter visitors, which included hen harrier, merlin, peregrine and short-eared owl.

This winter has seen good numbers of wading birds on Otmoor, which have provided an aerial display of their own. The numbers of golden plover (1,800) and lapwing (1,600) being seen on the reserve peaked in December. A number of other wading birds have also been recorded, including common sandpiper, bar-tailed godwit, redshank, dunlin, jack snipe and a wisp of snipe numbering up to 90 birds.

Wintering wildfowl species have been as expected. These have included gadwall, pochard, tufted duck, pintail, mallard and shoveler. Wigeon and teal, the most numerous of the reserve's wintering duck species, have had peak counts of 1,100 and 1,054 respectively. Two whooper swan were recorded in January.

This winter's top news has been the presence throughout January and February of a bittern in the reserve's reedbed and network of ditches. Many visitors have enjoyed clear sightings of this elusive and spectacular bird. Towards the end of the winter period the reserve's hedgerows have started to come alive with the chatter of song of great tit, blue tit and chaffinch, providing a tantalizing glimpse of the coming spring.

Bonfires

Please be courteous towards your neighbours if you're planning a garden bonfire. SODC gives the following advice on bonfires:

Bonfires can be a major nuisance to people for the following reasons:

- * they produce smoke and ash
- * they smell
- * they affect air quality
- * they may cause problems for people with asthma or chest conditions
- * they can stop people spending time in their gardens, opening windows or hanging out washing
- * they can reduce visibility on roads and lead to accidents

If you are planning a bonfire it is important that you follow the following advice:

- * burn dry material only
- * do not burn household rubbish, such as plastic, foam, paint or rubber
- * do not use old engine oil, meths or petrol to light the fire
- * do not light bonfires on damp, still days, or when the wind is likely to blow smoke over roads or neighbours' gardens
- * do not leave bonfires unattended or smouldering
